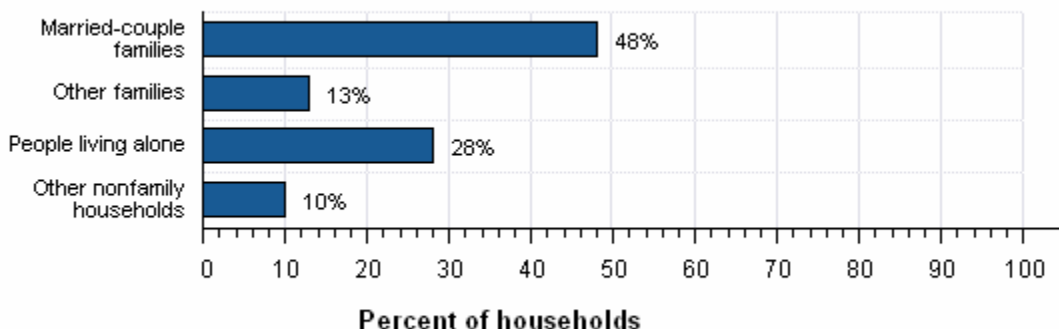

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2006 there were 138,000 households in Lane County. The average household size was 2.4 people.

Families made up 62 percent of the households in Lane County. This figure includes both married-couple families (48 percent) and other families (13 percent). Nonfamily households made up 38 percent of all households in Lane County. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Lane County, Oregon in 2006



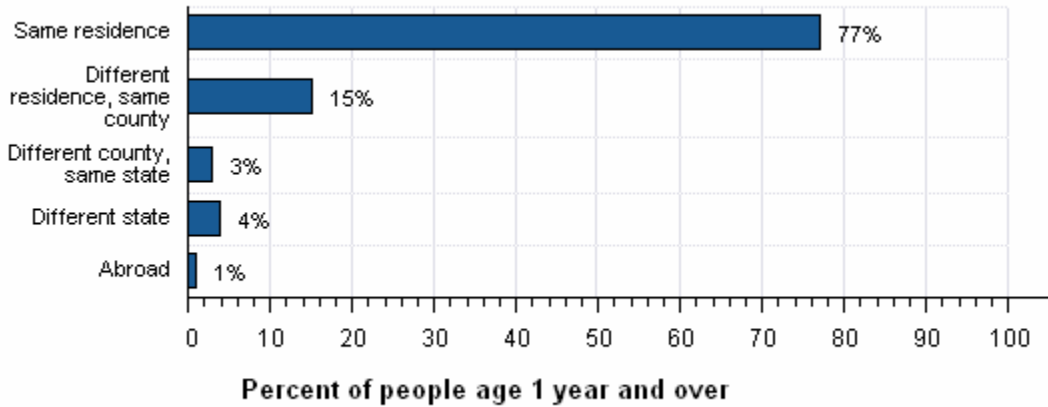

NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Six percent of the people living in Lane County in 2006 were foreign born. Ninety-four percent was native, including 46 percent who were born in Oregon.

Among people at least five years old living in Lane County in 2006, 11 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 58 percent spoke Spanish and 42 percent spoke some other language; 29 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2006, 77 percent of the people at least one year old living in Lane County were living in the same residence one year earlier; 15 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 3 percent from another county in the same state, 4 percent from another state, and 1 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Lane County, Oregon in 2006

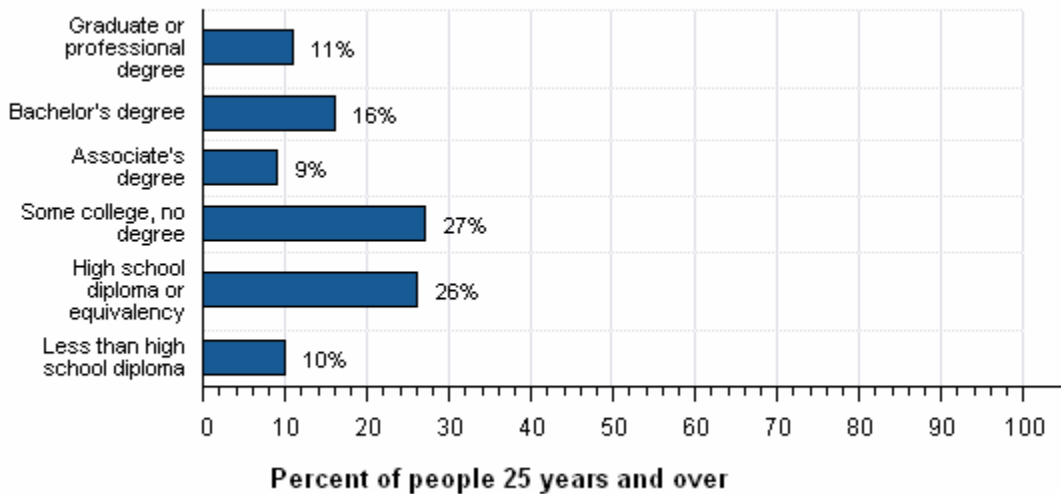

EDUCATION: In 2006, 90 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 28 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Ten percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Lane County was 87,000 in 2006. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 6,600 and elementary or high school enrollment was 48,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 33,000.

The Educational Attainment of People in Lane County, Oregon in 2006

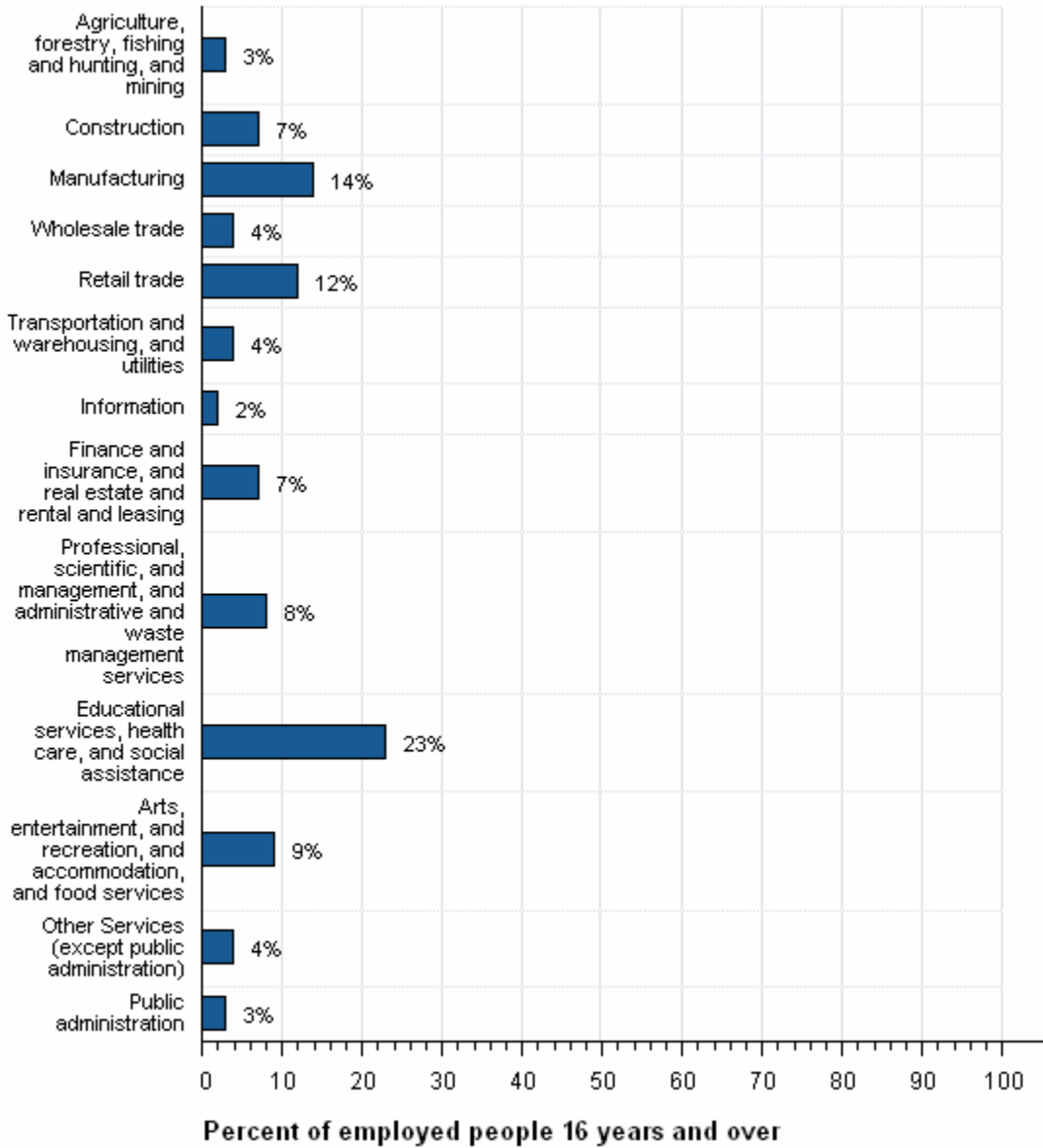

DISABILITY: In Lane County, among people at least five years old in 2006, 17 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 8 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 15 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 39 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2006, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Lane County were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 23 percent, and Manufacturing, 14 percent.

Employment by Industry in Lane County, Oregon in 2006



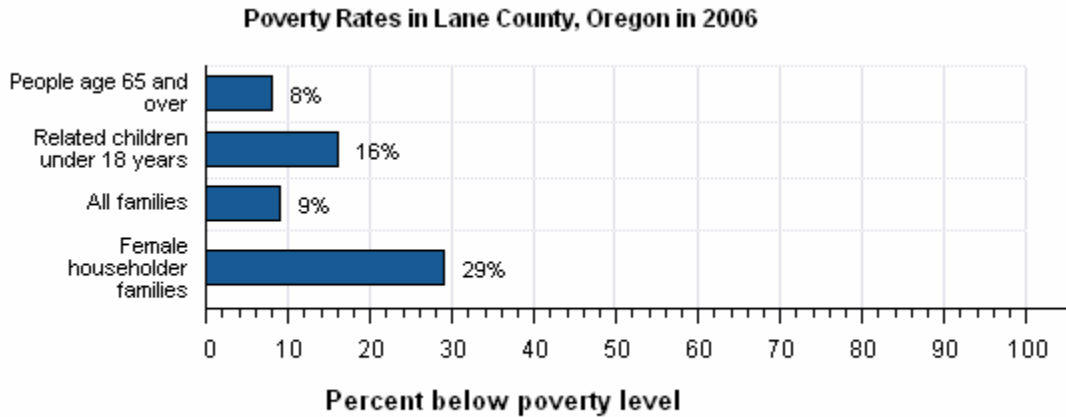

OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 33 percent; Sales and office occupations, 27 percent; Service occupations, 16 percent; Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 13 percent; and Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 10 percent. Seventy-eight percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 14 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 8 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

TRAVEL TO WORK: Seventy-two percent of Lane County workers drove to work alone in 2006, 12 percent carpooled, 4 percent took public transportation, and 8 percent used other means. The remaining 5 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 19.1 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Lane County was \$42,127. Seventy-seven percent of the households received earnings and 17 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Twenty-seven percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$14,567. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

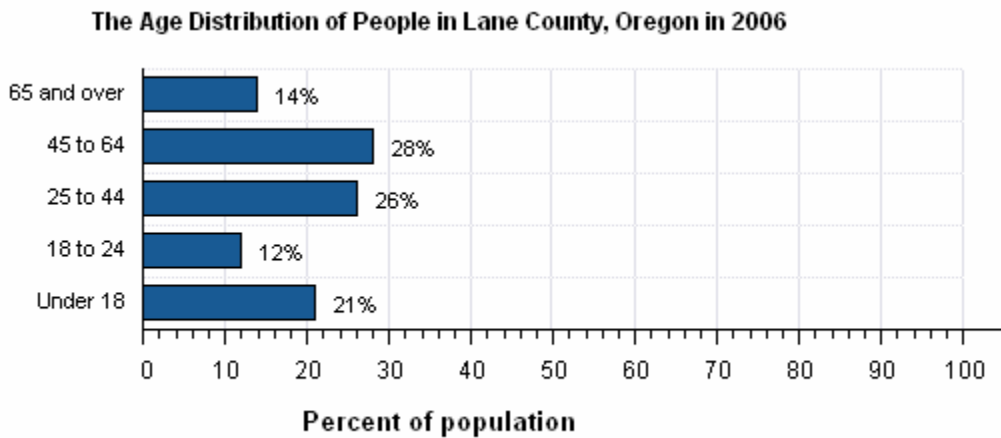
POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2006, 16 percent of people were in poverty. Sixteen percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 8 percent of people 65 years old and over. Nine percent of all families and 29 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.

POPULATION OF Lane County: In 2006, Lane County had a total population of 338,000 - 172,000 (51 percent) females and 166,000 (49 percent) males. The median age was 38 years. Twenty-one percent of the population was under 18 years and 14 percent was 65 years and older.

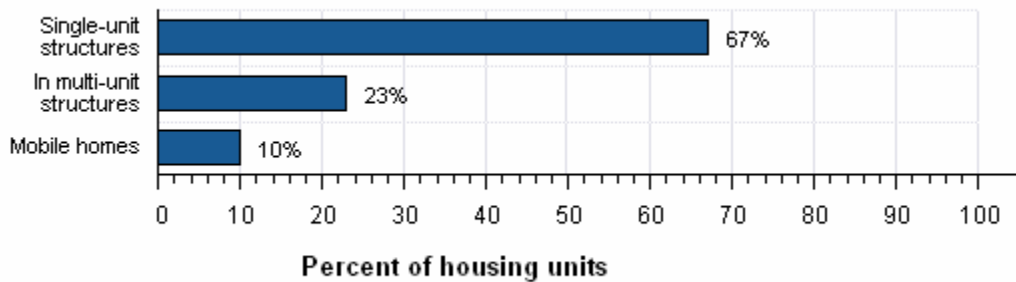
For people reporting one race alone, 92 percent was White; 1 percent was Black or African American; 2 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 3 percent was Asian; less than 0.5 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 2 percent was Some other race. Three percent reported Two or more races. Six percent of the people in Lane County was Hispanic. Eighty-seven percent of the people in Lane County was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Lane County had a total of 148,000 housing units, 7 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 67 percent was in single-unit structures, 23 percent was in multi-unit structures, and 10 percent was mobile homes. Twenty-six percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

The Types of Housing Units in Lane County, Oregon in 2006

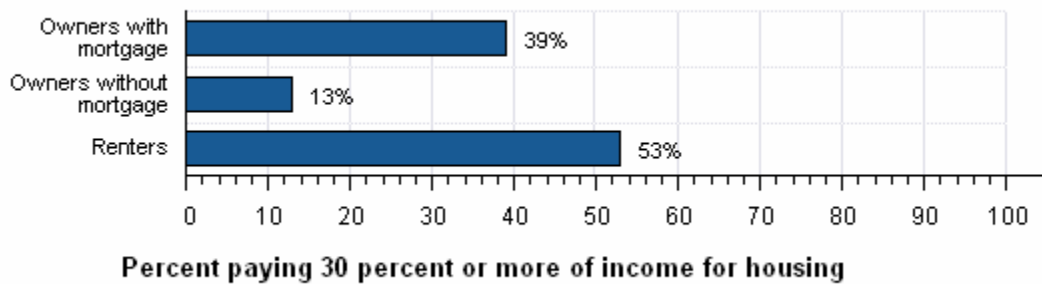

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Lane County had 138,000 occupied housing units - 84,000 (61 percent) owner occupied and 54,000 (39 percent) renter occupied. Three percent of the households did not have telephone service and 8 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Thirty-nine percent had two vehicles and another 21 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$1,278, nonmortgaged owners \$361, and renters \$698. Thirty-nine percent of owners with mortgages, 13 percent of owners without mortgages, and 53 percent of renters in Lane County spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.

The value shown here is the 90 percent margin of error. The margin of error can be interpreted roughly as providing a 90 percent probability that the interval defined by the estimate minus the margin of error and the estimate plus the margin of error (the lower and upper confidence bounds) contains the true value. In addition to sampling variability, the ACS estimates are subject to nonsampling error (for a discussion of nonsampling variability, see <http://www.census.gov/acs/www/Downloads/ACS/accuracy2006.pdf> Accuracy of the Data). The effect of nonsampling error is not represented in these tables.
