

<p>EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</p>	<p>Item: JAIBG/JCP Quarterly Report Action Required: None. Review only.</p>
<p>Background and Actions to Date</p>	<p>An outcome summary from the quarterly reports for October 1 through December 31, 2002 for the Juvenile Crime Prevention (JCP) Plan and the Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant (JAIBG) Plan are provided for review by the PSCC.</p> <p>In mid-1998, Governor John Kitzhaber requested counties to submit a Juvenile Crime Prevention (JCP) Plan to the State. Boards of County Commissioners were asked to designate an entity responsible for coordinating a consolidated juvenile crime prevention planning process. On June 24, 1998, the Lane Board of County Commissioners designated the Public Safety Coordinating Council (PSCC) as the planning body and Lane Council of Governments as the administrative host. The PSCC assigned the responsibility of developing the plan to the PSCC Prevention & Juvenile Justice Committee.</p> <p>Funds allocated through Lane County’s JCP Plan serve youth 10 to 17 years of age who have three or more of the following risk factors:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Anti-social or acting out behavior • Poor family functioning • School failure • Substance abuse • Negative peer association <p>and who are clearly demonstrating at-risk behaviors that have come to the attention of government or community agencies, schools, or law enforcement where, without intervention, such at-risk behavior could lead to imminent or increased involvement in the juvenile justice system.</p> <p>In 1999 the State of Oregon began allocating federal Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant (JAIBG) funds from the federal Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to counties and cities. The purpose is to provide the State and units of local government with funds to develop programs to promote greater accountability in the juvenile justice system.</p> <p>Outcome and output data is collected by LCOG quarterly on programs which receive JCP or JAIBG funds and are reported to the state. LCOG uses information provided by Department of Youth Services to calculate referral and reoffense rates for these programs to compare them to their target outcomes.</p>
<p>Action Needed</p>	<p>No action is required. The summary is provided for review only.</p>
<p>Pertinent Policy</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Local public safety coordinating councils are charged by ORS 423.565 with the following: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) Develop and recommend to the board of county commissioners the plan for use of state resources to serve the local youth offender population; Coordinate local juvenile justice policy among affected juvenile justice entities; and (2) In consultation with the local commission on children and families, develop and recommend to the county board of commissioners a plan designed to prevent criminal involvement by youth. The plan must provide for coordination of community-wide services involving treatment, education, employment and intervention strategies aimed at crime prevention. (3) Provide for the coordination of community-wide services involving prevention, treatment, education, employment resources, and intervention strategies aimed at crime prevention. ▪ ORS 423.560 states, “The local public safety coordinating council shall, at a minimum: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (a) Develop and recommend to the county board of commissioners a plan for the use of (B) State and local resources to serve the needs of the local offender population who are at least 15 years of age and less than 18 years of age, which plan must provide for the coordination of community-wide services involving prevention, treatment, education, employment resources and intervention strategies. ▪ The Board of County Commissioners designated PSCC as the planning body and

	<p>LCOG as the administrative host for the JCP Plan (Order No. 98-6-24-34) and most recently confirmed these designations May 29, 2002 (Order No. 02-5-29-2).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> All eleven jurisdictions who are allocated JAIBG funds have provided letters since 1999 designating PSCC as the advisory body and LCOG as the administrative host for the JAIBG Plan. These jurisdictions include; Lane County, Coburg, Creswell, Cottage Grove, Eugene, Junction City, Oakridge, Springfield, Veneta, Florence, and Westfir.
