Community Corrections Act Programs Quarterly Report: July - September 2002

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Introduction:

This report outlines a variety of summary statistics describing the treatment and supervision programs in Lane County currently funded by the Community Corrections Act. It covers the quarter ending September 30, 2002.

Update on Programs

ACES - Bridge Program:

ACES's Bridge Program provides substance abuse treatment and cognitive skills treatment to community corrections clients within the Forest Work Camp, and within the community. Their goal is to reduce recidivism among drug and alcohol involved criminal offenders in Lane County.

From July through September 2002, 20 clients received treatment from within the Forest Work Camp, and 109 received treatment within the community - for a total of 127 unduplicated offenders served¹. Forty-one unduplicated offenders were admitted into Bridge's treatment program (between the two sites) during this quarter. Nine were admitted to the FWC site, and 34 were admitted through the community program. Of the 127 clients served this quarter, seven successfully graduated between the two sites, three were terminated from the program for non-compliance, and one file was closed for unknown reasons. When combining program data with arrest histories, 18 of the 120 clients served for which we could match AIRS numbers were either arrested or cited in lieu of custody since their program entry date (these arrests/citations may have occurred while still in treatment, or after graduation/termination), for a total re-arrest rate of 15.0%.

Since this was the first quarter of the fiscal year, quarter and fiscal year summaries are the same.

Eugene Center for Family Development - Sex Offender Program:

CFD’s Sex Offender Program provides sex offender treatment in the form of identifying precursors to relapse, empathy development, anger and stress management, and other outpatient treatment strategies. Their goal is to provide treatment to adult sex offenders so they will not engage in sexual deviant behaviors.

During the quarter lasting from July through September 2002, 57 clients received treatment from the Sex Offender Program. Three clients were admitted as new clients during this quarter. Of the 57 clients served this quarter, no clients completed or exited the program. When combining program data with arrest histories, 11 of the 55 clients served for which AIRS numbers could be matched were either arrested or cited in lieu of custody since their program entry date (these arrests/citations may have occurred while still in treatment, or after graduation/termination), for a total re-arrest rate of 20.0%.

Since this was the first quarter of the fiscal year, quarter and fiscal year summaries are the same.

Aces - Drug Court:

Aces now provides outpatient treatment to offenders referred by the Lane County Drug Court Program (taking over for InAct, Inc. beginning in July of 2002). Their goal is to reduce substance abuse and/or dependency in the correctional population.

This quarter from July to September 2002 saw 202 clients received treatment. One hundred thirty-six of these were new clients². Of the 202 clients served this quarter, twelve clients successfully completed, seven had neutral completions, and twenty-four were terminated from the program as unsuccessful. When combining program data with arrest histories, 22 of the 193 clients served for AIRS numbers could be matched were either arrested or cited in lieu of custody since their program entry date (these arrests/citations may have occurred while still in treatment, or after graduation/termination), for a total re-arrest rate of 11.4%.

Since this was the first quarter of the fiscal year, quarter and fiscal year summaries are the same.

Lane County Mental Health - Mental Health Services:

LCMH's Mental Health Services program provides pre-treatment sessions, mental health assessments, case management, and anger management courses to clients under community supervision. Their goal is to reduce recidivism through treatment or management of substance abuse and mental health disorders, and to provide services usually unavailable to offenders or difficult for them to access.

Pre-Treatment Program:

During the quarter from July to September 2002 196 individuals attended a total of eight pre-treatment classes. Total class attendance for the quarter was 449 individuals. The average class attendance was 56.1 individuals.

Mental Health Assessments:

During the period from July through September of 2002 a total of 89 mental health assessments were conducted. Thirty-nine individuals were referred to Aces , sixteen to Chrysalis, nine to the Center for Family Development, and twenty-five to other treatment programs.

Case Management:

During the quarter from July through September 2002, Lane County ADO Case Management served four offenders. No individuals completed the program with all four remaining active. One of those individuals two began the program during the quarter.

Anger Management:

During the quarter from July through September 2002, seven individuals were referred to the anger management program.

Lane County Mental Health - Sex Offender Treatment Program:

LCMH’s Sex Offender Treatment Program provides sex offender evaluations and treatment (in the form of psycho-educational groups, intensive treatment, and medication management). Their goal is to reduce recidivism through the evaluation and treatment of sex offenders who are under community supervision.

During the quarter lasting from July to September 2002, 52 total clients received treatment from Lane County Mental Health’s Sex Offender Treatment Program. Of these, 21 individuals were admitted as new clients during this quarter. Thirty-one clients were active in Phase 1 during this quarter, and 26 were active in Phase 2 (These numbers may be duplicative of people active in Phase 1). Of the 52 clients served this quarter, three clients successfully completed the program, one was arrested or had their probation revoked, six exited due to non-compliance, three had their supervision expired, and four exited under unknown circumstances. When combining program data with arrest histories, three of the 50 clients served for which AIRS numbers could be matched were either arrested or cited in lieu of custody since their program entry date (these arrests/citations may have occurred while still in treatment, or after graduation/termination), for a total re-arrest rate of 6.0%.

Since this was the first quarter of the fiscal year, quarter and fiscal year summaries are the same.

Lane Shelter Care - Royal Avenue Program:

RAP provides crisis/transitional housing to offenders in the criminal justice system. Their goal is to assist mentally ill offenders in making the transition from correctional facilities to the community so they become successful, contributing members of the community.

From July to September 2002, three CCC clients were housed at Royal Avenue Program, with all of them admitted as new clients during this quarter³. Of the clients served this quarter, two left with unsuccessful completions of their stay. When combining program data with arrest histories, none of the three clients served was either arrested or cited in lieu of custody since they were first housed at the shelter (these arrests/citations may have occurred while still in living in the facility, or after leaving), for a total re-arrest rate of 0%.

Since this was the first quarter of the fiscal year, quarter and fiscal year summaries are the same.

Sponsors:

Sponsors is a local residential facility for people involved in the criminal justice system. Their goal is to support offenders in making the transition from correctional facilities to the community by assisting in obtaining employment and stable housing.

One hundred and ten clients received treatment from Sponsors between July and September 2002. Sixty-four clients were admitted as new clients during this quarter. Of the 110 clients served this quarter, 37 successfully completed treatment and 14 had an unsuccessful termination from the program. In addition the Honors Program at Sponsors served a total of twenty clients, with five clients having entered this quarter. Of the twenty clients in the Honors Program this quarter, three clients successfully completed the program, and one was terminated unsuccessfully. When combining program data with arrest histories, 6 of the 102 clients served during the quarter for which AIRS numbers could be matched (Unduplicated number of clients in regular program and the Honors Program) were either arrested or cited in lieu of custody since their program entry date (these arrests/citations may have occurred while still in treatment, or after graduation/termination), for a total re-arrest rate of 5.9%.

Custody Referee’s Office - Pre-Trial Release Program:

The Custody Referee’s Office is Lane County’s Pre-Trial Supervision Program, located in the Jail.

From July to September 2002, 1,779 defendants were interviewed (a total of 2,046 times) to determine their eligibility for a pre-trial release agreement. During this quarter, a total of 1,164 release agreements were made (239 were released on own recognizance agreements, 382 were conditional releases, 417 were supervised release agreements, two were third party releases, 72 were a combination of agreements, and 52 security release agreements). Of the total 1,164 release agreements this quarter, 247 were violated. When looking at release violations, we found that 211 were violated by the defendant failing to appear in court, four were recorded as program failures, ten were contact violations, 14 were reporting failures, five were for new crimes and three were technical violations.

Parole & Probation – Community Supervision:

Lane County’s Community Supervision program is run through our Parole & Probation Department. Offenders who are included in these analyses are those who were under probation, parole, or post-prison supervision.

From July to September 2002, 547 offenders began a new supervision agreement. A total of 497 sanctions were administered to all offenders on supervision agreements, with 305 of them being jail sanctions, 52 were revocations to

prison, 33 were a verbal or written reprimand, 46 were road crew sanctions, eight were outpatient treatment sanctions, one was a community service sanction, and 52 were other types of sanction.

Lane County Adult Corrections:

From July through September 2002, there were 4,026 admissions into jail. These admissions involved 3,279 unduplicated defendants. Within that same period, there were 4,404 releases from jail (with 3,696 unduplicated defendants being released). Due to changes in the AIRS data system, a summary of alternative program assignments is no longer available to LCOG staff assigned to CCA program reporting tasks.
